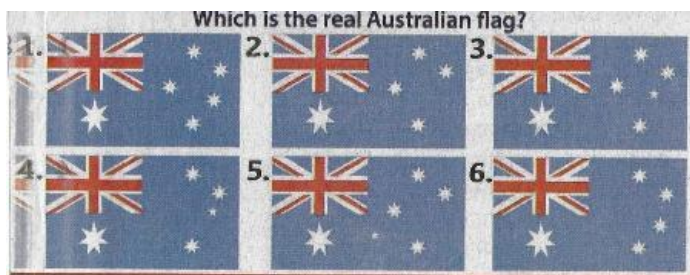

Q & A at Parliament House

I was invited to attend a Parliamentary Screening of the uplifting new ABC series 'Old People's Homes For 4 Year Old's', held at Parliament House, Canberra on Wednesday 16 October 2019. I was accompanied by my granddaughter Brooke Walsh.

Waiting for us outside the entrance doors of Parliament House was a very excited Craig Gear, CEO Older Persons Advocacy, claiming he was the biggest fan of the programme. Craig took it upon himself to escort us to the drinks and nibbles area. I only had 2 sips of wine because we were constantly being greeted by other guests. "Can I have a photo"? First up was Joe O'Brien, ABC Studio Director. "I'm a massive fan of the programme, must have a photo Shirley and I want you in the front row in the theatre because I want to ask you a question."

At the entrance doors to the theatre a staff member said. "The ministers have arrived Shirley and want to meet you." We were escorted back through a very large crowd to meet Minister Colbeck, who apologised for not speaking to me after Q&A session the week before.

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As we were chatting, there was an announcement that guests should take their seats in the theatre for the screening. Being the shy shrinking violet, which I am not, I asked the Minister if he would escort me into the theatre. As he said “Delighted to”, I linked my arm in his and he helped me down a lot of steps to the front row. We chatted all the way, he asked where my family lived and I told him they were scattered in 3 different states. Sitting down, he told me his family was also scattered because of his work. He said he watched the programme on his iPad. “I enjoyed the whole programme”.

The screening occurred and following, there was to be a short panel discussion, with leaders in aged care and early childhood learning with Craig Gear: CEO Older Persons Advocacy, Fiona May: CEO Playgroup Australia, Dr. Anneke Fitzgerald: The intergenerational Care Project Griffith University and Debbie Cuell: Executive Producer (programme) Endemol Shine.

The discussion was moderated by Joe O’Brien who gave welcoming remarks. Minister Colbeck gave his welcoming address acknowledging his parliamentary colleagues in the audience, praising the programme and telling us that he has a long line of people knocking on his door asking for money!!

The first short episode of a video was shown of a playgroup where mothers took their babies and toddlers into a retirement village. When they placed the baby into the arms of the residents, it was a beautiful sight to see the residents faces light up and the big smiles as they gazed at the babies.

Joe O’Brien asked me “What did you get out of the programme”? “It put a twinkle in my eye, a spring in my step and warmth back into my tired old bones”. I was asked to stand up and turn around, “This is Shirley”, as I looked up to a sea of faces, Oh Wow!! I was overwhelmed there must have been more than 500 people applauding.

The last episode was screened and before the panel could start, all the members of Parliament were called back to the house. It was a sitting week.

Q&A was cancelled but the four panel members continued on for 5 minutes each and gave a very articulate overview of each of their roles in the intergenerational programmes they were involved in.

As the evening continued, people came down and stood 7 & 8 deep waiting for photos. They had travelled from other states and had asked permission to use the photos to promote the programme within

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their suburbs, towns cities and state.

I feel that the networking I was able to do with these very enthusiastic educators and keeping the conversation going, was more than worthwhile. The opportunity for others to connect, encouraging them to continue to build greater rapport within their groups, as they return to their communities, must add value to the programme.

“What would it cost to implement an intergenerational programme?”

It would not cost a lot of money. A driver, petrol, a mini bus to pick the children up drive to a retirement village and take them back to their preschool.
