SANDS OF GALLIPOLI MEDALLIONS RAFFLE

The sub-Branch is holding a fundraising raffle of two sets of limited-edition Sands of Gallipoli medallions. The raffle will be drawn on 8th December 2022 at the sub-Branch Christmas function in the Lone Pine Lounge.

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First prize is a set of six Lone Pine medallions in a timber finish presentation stand, valued at \$225.00. This beautiful set of high-quality medallions features images from Drew Harrison's painting "The Battle of Lone Pine". The medallions are minted from brass alloy and finished in highly polished and frosted silver, over-printed in full colour. Accompanying this set is a glass vial containing authentic sand from Gallipoli, a colour print of the painting set in a metal frame and a full-sized replica 1904 Rising Sun hat badge. The set comes with a numbered certificate of authenticity.



Second prize is a set of six limited edition medallions valued at \$195.00. This set housed in a timber finish display case, features six proof medallions depicting images of the Gallipoli campaign. One of the images is of John Simpson Kirkpatrick, the Man with the Donkey at Anzac Cove, which soon became one of the most prominent symbols of Australian courage and tenacity at Gallipoli. There is also a replica 1904 Rising Sun hat badge and a vial of Gallipoli sand. The set comes with a numbered certificate of authenticity.

Tickets are \$5.00 each and only 500 tickets will be offered for sale. Tickets will be sold by volunteers throughout ANZAC Village, at a pop-up shop in the Gallipoli Building and at sub-Branch meetings.

Over the years I have conducted many funerals and RSL Funeral Tributes. While I consider it both an honour and a privilege to assist in both, each brings with it some concern.

When I sit with families they are unsure of which funeral directors they should use. Neither Rev Tony nor I recommend any one particular company. Instead I ask if they have a preference for Australian owned and operated or not. Many funeral companies have been absorbed into one conglomerate. I generally list a few on the Northern Beaches and leave it to the family to make contact.

Secondly, many families are unsure of what either they or their loved ones would like. What music would you like played at your service? What are the different elements you might like? Perhaps this is something to discuss well beforehand.

When conducting the RSL Funeral Tribute we often have no more than *Name/Rank/Official number*. Perhaps you might have an interesting story or two to tell.

Have you updated your will? Some years ago I was conducting a DVA pensions interview with an old WWII veteran and I asked if his will was current. “Yes”, he said, “*it is the one they made me fill out when I joined in '42.*”

My simple point is that we all need to be prepared for what will come.

THE STORY OF CYRIL AUSTIN HAINES



Cyril Austin HAINES was born in Crookwell in January 1906, the third of seven children.

Their father, James HAINES contracted the ‘Spanish Flu’ in 1919 and died aged forty-seven, leaving a wife, Nellie and seven children. They were very poor and Nellie and the children had to survive the best way they could.

In January 1920, Cyril, aged fourteen passed the Qualifying Certificate Examination in Sydney, which provided a bursary to attend Goulburn High School, but due to the family's lack of funds to provide transport, the bursary was never taken up.

Cyril met a man called Monty KERR who became Cyril’s mentor and set him out on a career of a travelling salesman, working across the southern half of the state of NSW. He was highly successful and made a comfortable living.

Cyril HAINES was deemed unfit for military service in World War II, so he enlisted to serve the war effort in a civilian capacity. He was a Staff Officer in the Personnel Branch of the Civil Constructional Corps (CCC) of Allied Works Council between 25th September 1942 and 21st April 1945.

The CCC was established in April 1942 to supply labour for the creation of infrastructure like airfields, gun emplacements, barracks, roads and other projects undertaken by the Allied Works Council.

All men between the ages of 18 and 60 could be conscripted into the CCC unless they were serving in the armed forces or employed in a reserved occupation. They received pay based on civilian award rates, but their work was highly regulated: they could not strike and might be sent anywhere in Australia.

At its peak strength in August 1943, almost 54,000 men were serving in the CCC. They engaged in hundreds of projects worth millions of pounds. Almost one-third of them were conscripted – or “manpowered,” the term current at the time. By the end of the war 77,500 men had served in the CCC. They had served in every state and territory and made an invaluable contribution to the war effort.

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Cyril HAINES travelled from Avalon Beach every day on the double-decker buses to his job with the Allied Works Council in Sydney. Some of these special wartime buses were built on old truck chassis, some had plywood bodies and were prone to breakdown. People had to travel on these at night with all the full metal windows closed, and they had to rely on the conductors to tell them where their stops were.

With mandatory brownouts in place, a night-time precaution against the perceived likelihood of Japanese air raids, the camouflage buses featured solid metal windows instead of glass, and headlamp hoods that aimed a paltry slit of light towards the ground.

There was also a requirement for regional travel, for example in September 1943, Cyril was part of a group of CCC officers and doctors who travelled to Broken Hill to spend a week interviewing men who may be conscripted into the service.

Cyril HAINES was awarded The Civilian Service Medal 1939 - 1945, for his service during World War II. The Civilian Service Medal 1939-1945 recognised the service of eligible civilians in Australia during World War II.
