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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

For the first time since 2014 I was privileged to attend the RSL NSW Annual State Congress and AGM. Held in Newcastle it was the first major face to face meeting in a long time. There were many in attendance, both in person and on-line.

While the formal Minutes are not yet available, below is a synopsis of proceedings.

In his opening remarks, Ray James OAM, State President focused on the purpose of the RSL being more for the Defence family. He stated there is more than enough money held by sub-Branchedes to fund all necessary and needed projects. While many sub-Branchedes make significant contributions there are still some who fail to work outside of their own membership. Ray also stated that we need to work more with the Defence industry. In closing he thanked RSL LifeCare Veterans Services for their outstanding work.

Following a tribute to Her Late Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, the National President spoke highlighting the issues we are all facing with DVA. He said we are the victims of our own success in that serving members have been encouraged to make claims while they are serving rather than wait until they complete their enlistments. This has caused a 50% increase in DVA claims and hence the great backlog. He also stated more professionals were needed in country areas. Having said this, he went on to advise that the UK only instituted their DVA equivalent in 2019 while NZ does not have a DVA equivalent. Finally, Mr Mellick said that the issue of the 'Australian Wars' – indigenous war – was not an issue for the Australian War Memorial but for the National Museum. The role of the RSL has not changed in that we are called to be the conscience of the nation.

Her Excellency the Honourable Margaret Beazley AC KC, Governor of New South Wales, as RSL NSW Patron, recognised the outstanding work of the RSL during the pandemic.

Other presentations were given and I am sure these will be highlighted in other publications.

GUEST SPEAKER – NIKI YOUNG **A brief of her Presentation**

At the last sub-Branch general meeting we were fortunate to have the RSL LifeCare (RSLLC) Chief Business Improvement Officer, Nicki Young, as our Guest Speaker. Those who were not in attendance missed a most enlightening and confidence building address. Nicki has kindly allowed the Editor to include some of what she spoke about for all to read.

Nicki, the day before the meeting, had been officially appointed to act in the capacity of General Manager Retirement Living following Robin Grady's resignation. Nicki explained several changes in the organisation and these are some of the matters she addressed:

- * Her career has encompassed the RAN, Nursing, Medibank, IHMS and establishing a charity for Veterans, etc.
- * The RSLLC organisation is focused on changing its culture and the "revolving door" concept of management will not continue. There is a new CEO, a new Chairman of the Board with 3 new members also recently appointed to the Board. (Both the CEO and Chairman attended the RSL NSW State Congress and AGM in Newcastle in late October and attended and took part in our Remembrance Day Service.)
- * RSLLC is a multi-faceted business with 4 distinct entities – Retirement Aged Care (RAC), Independent Retirement Living (IRL), Veteran Services and Home Care. People can move through all four areas.
- * Until January this year RSLLC's RAC stayed COVID-Free. This was very different to many businesses in that industry and because we had done so well, we received the poorest government support.
- * Some RSLLC facilities have been badly affected by floods – Lismore, Richmond.
- * Staff shortages are common to many industries and RAC is no exception and higher levels of skill and wage increases will go a long way towards correcting this problem.
- * The business focus is on customers, people, quality, and business viability.
- * The next 6 months or so should see the development of a new culture and service.
- * RSLLC has 30 RAC facilities with 2200 bed licenses, 27 villages with 2400 independent living units, 20 Home Care facilities, Veteran Services are in Wagga Wagga, Nowra, Ballina and Newcastle. RSLLC employs approximately 3,700 – it is a large organisation.

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- * Nicki emphasised the need to maintain the history of veterans as a theme running through our village at Narrabeen.
- * The Equine Centre at Picton offers courses for veterans and others – 14 horses, it is booked well ahead, runs 3 courses and is well worth a visit.
- * The Veteran employment program is going well, and is looking to work with RSL Queensland in training veterans in Aged Care – this has been very successful.
- * Raising funds from sub-Branches and other organisations is important for the long-term sustainability of these veteran programs.
- * RSLLC is working closely with RAC and IRL to better support and connect with veterans.
- * In RAC recent accreditation assessments, 3 facilities met every criteria indicating best practice and quality care efforts are paying off. There is increased attention to food and lifestyle (activity) as these two areas have been the most criticised in the past.
- * Home Care is growing and there is a need to expand in this area with demand expected to increase over the next few years. Staff need to be highly skilled and we have recently introduced a "Cleaner to Carer" pathway that has been very popular.
- * Nicki took questions from the floor and covered topics like - the RSL emblem removal and the Narrabeen site, the importance of the Narrabeen commemoration services including ANZAC Dawn Service, Wirraway and Tobruk not being fit for purpose, social progress for veterans, an obligation to provide some low-income accommodation, and other topics.

Nicki was thanked for taking time to speak with us and this was endorsed with enthusiastic applause.
