# **ANZAC Day Fundraising 2023**

Without the wonderful effort by a small group of sub-Branch members and five non-member volunteer helpers, this successful fundraising campaign would not have been possible.

We did several things differently in 2023. There was a pop-up table in the Gallipoli Building for nine days, at Warriewood Square for four days and at Augusta shops for two days. All of these venues proved valuable in contributing to the result.

About 32% of transactions were made through the two Square EFTPOS terminals.

Display of the new sub-Branch pull-up banner at Warriewood Square assisted in identifying the fundraising entity as the War Vets and promoted RSL NSW branding.

Two additional suppliers were used this year. Samford RSL sub-Branch in Queensland introduced a new range of pins and badges and Pens.com supplied the novel lantern pens.

Unsold stock from Remembrance Day 2022 amounted to \$513.03 and a further \$2,102.50 of new items and proven sellers was purchased. Some of the stock carried over from 2022 was reduced in price and all the items were sold during this campaign.

# A related story from Shirley Beggs



The Hospital Ship Centaur

My late father-in-law, Jack Rawson Beggs, was an ambulance driver with the 2/12 Field Ambulance. He was on leave waiting to board a hospital ship to New Guinea when a telegram arrived advising him of the earlier departure time of 12<sup>th</sup> May 1943, or alternatively a train trip to Queensland to board the ship there. He chose the second option and was not on board when the *Centaur* was torpedoed on the 14<sup>th</sup> May. His best friend George survived the sinking and his watch is in the War Museum at Canberra.

My husband was discharged from the RAAF in 1975 and we settled in Blacktown. (His father had died in 1972). He was contacted by the *Centaur* Society and invited to their annual commemoration service at Concord Hospital but was never able to attend because of work commitments.

There was no *Centaur* memorial plague at the War Museum at Canberra, the federal Government would not provide it. Donations were called for and eventually we were invited to the unveiling ceremony - by this time we were retirees and were able to attend. There was much disappointment when the plague was laid into a footpath and not on a wall.

At the following reception we met some of the survivors, including George, as well as some of his old Army mates.

We have also been to a *Centaur* memorial service at Tweed heads, where children from the local school attended. This is an annual event which I hope will continue to be held for many years to come.



### YOUNG ENDEAVOUR YOUTH SCHEME



The sub-Branch committee has been working with Pittwater House with a view of providing a community scholarship for one of their students to the youth scheme. An amount of \$4,000 has been set aside from the sub-Branch funds for the scholarship.

The Young Endeavour Youth Scheme provides young Australians with a unique, challenging, and inspirational experience at sea aboard the national Sail Training Ship *Young Endeavour*.

As a member of the 24 strong youth crew, each participant will be challenged to sail a square-rigged tall ship during an eleven-day adventure at sea, usually departing from ports on the eastern or southern coasts of Australia.

In learning how to sail the ship they are learning how to work together as a team, and to recognise and appreciate the strengths of a diverse group of individuals. They are supported by our specially trained Royal Australian Navy staff crew and encouraged to step out of their comfort zones, becoming more self-aware and building the confidence to actively contribute and to take leadership roles amongst their peers.

Each day on board is different, depending on where the ship is sailing and the prevailing conditions. Youth crew spend several days and nights at sea learning the skill to sail a square-rigged ship, as well as participating in games and team building activities on deck.


Participants live 'between decks' in a close community. With no Wi-Fi or mobile phones, they have the opportunity to be present, focus on the program, build their interpersonal skills and challenge themselves. They learn how to navigate, keep watch, cook in the galley, set and furl sails, climb the mast, and take the helm. There are also opportunities to swim, play sports, visit islands, spot whales and dolphins, and get to know some amazing people.

The Sail Training Ship *Young Endeavour* was gifted to the people of Australia by the United Kingdom in 1988. Since then, it has successfully delivered more than 600 development voyages and embarked more than 14,000 youth for a structured adventure at sea.

A snap shot back in history – by Jan Slater

"Farvie" is my Great-grandfather Joseph Blackmore. "Maisie" is my cousin first removed. She went to London and was killed in the Blitz 1940 whilst working as an Army Nurse in a Hospital.



On the left of the image is Joseph holding his grand-daughter Maisie. The post card on the right was written to him by her in 1920 on his death. She was killed in the London blitz (bombing) 1940.

The wording on the post card follows:

Oh, Farvie are you lonely in that land so far away.

When from your only little pet your life was drawn away.

But Farvie, though we're parted your grandchild still you love.

When you look down upon me from that happy land above.

Oh, Farvie do you watch me when

in my bed I lie.

You cannot see the darkness upon this lonely earth.

Oh, surely God, thee cannot know what you to me am worth.

Oh, Farvie if you do see God upon his Heavenly throne

Please ask him can you have your pet, just for a little loan.

Oh, I should be so glad and pleased with you oh Farvie dear.

For I could not be lonely as there's nothing there to fear.
